11. Participate in local, state, and national rallies.

13. Respond to all Campers on Mission related communications within 48 hours.

PLEASE READ: MEMBERS CHOOSING A HOME CHAPTER

The last few years COM has evolved into a different type of organization. The year of 2020 had an effect on people changing lifestyles. Families being mobile with their jobs, and homeschooling being done more by these parents who are full time in their rigs. Being Christians, they are looking for ways to serve The Lord, and expose their children to missions "As They Go"

Some are choosing multi memberships for this reason, to travel and serve while they are full time with children. Plus, there are those that are choosing in their retired years to live full time in their rigs. They still want to serve The Lord as they travel too.

It's a great problem to have, members choosing several states to join. Then they have many choices to volunteer as they travel. (keep in mind cost of rv sites are costly, as a volunteer in COM most projects provide full hook ups, and in some cases meals) So this is very attractive to people to join COM, but with no ties to state chapter when no guidelines are in place in your bylaws.

If all members just travel with no connection or commitment to a particular state, eventually there will be no one to fill state officers' positions. Or a member could hold officer positions in several states and create other complications.

As National: When an application online is received, we talk to the potential member as their intentions, desires, etc.

At that time, we ask what state will you be choosing as your Home Chapter?

We explain: When choosing a state as a Home Chapter, this should be a state you will frequent more than any other state. Each state has bylaws, some states members must attend at least one state meeting, work a state project, and or a National Rally each year. If as a member we do not meet the requirements of our Home Chapter, we will not be listed as an active member and will no longer receive any communications from state chapter or national. National ID cards will be null and void, by state presidents informing national of a member not meeting state chapter qualifications for membership.

Organizations that are volunteer orientated, do not work on state levels. They have projects, but no need for officers to run their group. COM is like a family, states depend on membership to volunteer at state kid camps, churches, state fairs etc.

National discussed Home Chapters and the concerns at National Rally during Presidents Round Table, and business meeting in depth. National encourages each state to discuss this with your board and members of your state chapter. Do you as a chapter need to consider changing requirements, qualifications for membership?

Campers on Mission seeks new generation to help with projects in local areas

Roger Woodard and his wife, June, sold their home and property in 2017 and bought a camper to serve 24/7 with Campers on Mission.

Since then, the Woodards have served on various projects, including helping repair or expand several churches and campgrounds.

In April, Woodard, a former pastor, became president of Alabama Campers on Mission.

"It's a new mission for me [in retirement] and I love it," he said.

Like other state chapters, Alabama Campers on Mission is a group of evangelical Christians who volunteer at various missions projects across the state and nation while mostly staying in campers.

In Alabama, there are more than 100 campers who participate, helping with construction, festivals, backyard Bible clubs, Baptist children's homes, disaster relief and more in the Southeast.

Much-needed help

"A lot of the churches [we help] aren't able to afford to build the buildings because labor is a major part of any construction [project]," said Woodard, sharing an example of how he helped add a soup kitchen facility to a church. "We're able to furnish a much-needed part of something that they desperately need to expand their ministry."

Woodard recalled meeting one woman at Mount Zion Missionary Baptist Church in Enterprise who wasn't quite sure what to think of Campers on Mission.

"She told us, 'When we saw all these people come in these nice campers, we didn't know what to expect. After sitting down and talking and listening, we realized we're all just God-fearing, Christ-loving individuals trying to do our best to serve the Lord in whatever way possible," Woodard said.

When the work was complete, Woodard remembered that "everyone was crying.... It had become such a family fellowship of loving one another and helping one another.

"You're torn that you're leaving, and yet you know that you've done what God had wanted you to do there," he added.

The following year, that church helped Campers on Mission with another local missions project.

"They testified how the fellowship with us had encouraged them and that they were reaching out and growing in a direction they had never expected before," Woodard said. "It truly opened up new doors for them to reach out to the community and serve the Lord."

The camaraderie of Campers on Mission exists not just between them and the churches they help but among the campers themselves. "There are people who come from all walks of life. We have people who have worked on space shuttles, worked in the FBI, people who have been associated as commercial pilots, military helicopter pilots," Woodard said. "After a while, everyone becomes family."

Training volunteers

Although some people have no previous construction experience, other campers will train them to help grow their expertise.

They'll spend every day together on the project anywhere from two weeks to three months, depending on the project size. Some of the women prefer to put their sewing skills to work during projects, sew-ing for missionaries or other needs.

Ken Conaway, regional coordinator for Alabama COM, noted the generosity of those who serve.

"Everybody in the group has a servant's heart, a giving mentality," explained Conaway, who has worked on more than 100 projects since 2005. "If they weren't givers, why would [many of them] own an RV, travel, pay for fuel, provide tools and expertise — and do all that for free?"

"The mentality of America today is what's in it for me? Well, what's in it for us is a giver's heart. Everybody loves the Lord and is appreciative of

what the shed blood of Christ has done for us."

Currently, Alabama campers work on about eight to 10 projects a year.

Shocco Springs Baptist Conference Center in Talladega is a popular work site. It's estimated the

camp has saved millions of dollars through the volunteers' consistent service since the 1990s, which has kept costs lower for camp attendees.

"We go there twice a year to work with maintenance and repair," Woodard said. "We just have a wonderful time doing that."

Going forward, Woodard hopes to see more people volunteer with Alabama Campers on Mission.

"Right now, I'm trying to encourage younger people to join," Woodard said. "The average age is in the 70s. That's just tough doing construction work when you have people that age.

"We're going to try our best to recruit people to come and develop a servant's heart to try and reach out and serve others," Woodard continued. "[Campers on Mission] is a necessary part of missions in local areas."
